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Note from our Founder

Looking back at 2024-25

As we complete one more year of service, I look back at the year we had to acknowledge some of the developments here, at Shishu Mandir. The most significant work carried out during the past year was the restructuring of Shishu Mandir. This was the first time that Indian and German societies met to share their views on this topic. The need to restructure society comes from the need to meet the challenges of a fast-moving world.

I am happy that we had an open discussion on the criteria for membership, expansion of EC members, and the creation of one more entity under Section 8 of the Companies Act, which will ensure better governance. We intend to form more management committees where EC members and staff can share the responsibilities for each section. I fully endorse the decision of the EC to engage a professional team to analyse our existing systems and propose the necessary changes that would help Shishu Mandir for better governance.

While there is a desire to increase our services to the poor, both in terms of the number of beneficiaries and also many more projects, I request that we go slowly in any form of expansion, as it is bound to bring down the quality of our services, for which we are highly appreciated by all.

Moving to more pleasant news. This year is also a year of several achievements. I am highly pleased with the completion of the construction of the multipurpose halls (dining hall), which I considered a most urgent need for the school. Where in the past children had their meals in the verandah, facing heat, cold and rain often, it's a joy to see them eating in the hall. Our kitchen is well-equipped and spacious now. It was not a simple undertaking and needed a lot of planning and resources. As we approach 25 years in Kithiganur, I consider the new kitchen

and hall to be a big gift to the kitchen department, who toil from 5 am to 6 pm every day to provide nutritious and varieties of food to over 500 students and staff.

I am also happy to see an aero-modelling lab in addition to the STEM Lab, to prepare students, especially girls, towards becoming pilots. It will make our children dream big and perhaps realise them.

I am very happy to see the efforts that have been put in for planting trees to increase the greenery both in the school and in the Home. I appreciate all the efforts that are taken to conserve energy through solar power plants, efforts in saving water and a waste management system which is indeed making our school eligible for a green school certification.

Although the Sulibele land was purchased in the year 2008, I had the opportunity to visit it for the first time this year. It was a pleasant surprise to see how well that land is being cared for, with

hundreds of fruit trees and simple construction to make it a campsite. I wish to express my desire to make the campsite even better, with more toilets, bathing facilities and more rooms for the caretaker's family and for our school children when they camp here.

I am pleased to see that we are supporting government organisations now. In the vocational training centre, we worked with an ITI facility which lacked basic facilities for training.

Students from the fitters and electrical courses were invited to our centre for practical training. We also trained the final year students of a government school in KR Puram in Tally, which will help them a little in being employed.

I was very happy to hear of the initiatives we took for uplifting some government schools. We installed RO plants in 20 government schools along with water harvesting systems. We are providing computer training in 5 government schools with our mobile computer lab, and have expanded the evening tuition centres from 2 to 5. We support yet another government school with an English teacher and have provided tables, chairs and smart boards to three government schools.

I would also like to acknowledge the work of our Home staff. Receiving the best adoption centre award from the government for three consecutive years for the whole of Karnataka is not a small thing. It is because of the immense work put in by the Home team in taking care of every child who comes to us, and with all kinds of issues, be it waiting for the completion of the DNA test of the biological parents or having a cleft lip who needs several surgeries, their patience and care for the babies and women in crisis deserves to be acknowledged.

It is also gratifying to see that our women empowerment programme through the E-auto project has become a model for several NGOs to replicate in Bangalore as well as in other cities in India. It is a novel project with an impact visible in a short time. 184 women own e-autos because of us, and earn a minimum of Rs.45,000 per month. I am happy that our work can uplift the lives of so many families, and by adopting an

environmentally friendly means.

We are able to handhold a few NGOs to carry out their services for the poor by connecting them with companies and individuals for support. Because of our efforts, Sharon School remains open despite a financial crisis, allowing 230 students to continue their education. Advaya, started by our past students, are backed by us, which allows them to take care of the education of about 100 students. We supported the rejuvenation of Kithiganur Lake and the running of one boys' home and two girls' homes.

Dear members, all this was possible because of your cooperation, involvement and the hard work of our staff. Let us continue to serve the needy in keeping with our motto: Look up to the stars, be aware of the streets beneath!

HOW WE HELP

As a licensed adoption centre, we take in infants and look after them until they find a family, as per CARA guidelines. Our social workers handle the paperwork and rigorous follow-ups to ensure that both, infant and parents are supported as best as possible. Our crisis-shelter services protects vulnerable mothers and safeguards newborns at risk of abandonment.

HOW WE HELP

Mangala Home provides a safe, empowering space where adolescent girls and young women can come for a temporary or long period, to finish school, pursue higher studies or learn a trade. Many come here to have a place that allows them to focus on their education and especially, during exams when a place that is conducive to focus on studies is needed.

Towards this, we have STEM labs, art studios and professional sports coaching, that has translated into good academic outcomes with the school leaving exams. Through our various programmes, we ensure that no child is left behind.

This programme enables students who do well in academics to pursue higher education with financial support from us. 
For the third year in a row, Shishu Home recorded the highest number of adoptions in Karnataka, while ensuring every baby received dignified, attentive care from day one. Alongside adoptions, our social workers took up rigorous home study assessments and support for prospective adoptive parents. We also serve as a shelter for women in crisis.


2024-25 KEY NUMBERS

- 30 babies (19 surrendered, 10 abandoned, 1 orphaned; 13 boys, 17 girls; 9 with special needs; 6 under POCSO)
- Outcomes: 16 adoptions; 2 restored to biological families; 12 babies currently in care.
- Home Study Reports: 428 completed (244 new, 184 revalidation).
- PAP counselling: 261 prospective-adoptive parents (PAP) supported with counselling.

ADOPTIONS AT SHISHU

While we continue to take newborns who are abandoned or given up, we also accept those with **special needs** as many Homes are unable to do so because of the additional cost of medical needs. **Time to placement** stretched for complex POCSO/abandonment cases because of legal and DNA clearances, which kept some babies in care longer; while this safeguards children's rights, it also increases caregiving demands. On a positive note, **428** HSRs and **261** families were counselled, pointing to a growing willingness to adopt.

EXTRAORDINARY CASES POCSO RESCUE

A 12-year-old was admitted by the Child Welfare Committee at eight months of pregnancy. She delivered via C-section and chose to surrender the baby. Not long after, the young girl lost her mother as well. We secured her a school and hostel admission and admitted her older sister to Mangala Home and our School. We have committed to support both the girls.

REINTEGRATION WITH BIOLOGICAL FAMILIES

Two infants were restored to their biological families after thorough counselling and due diligence confirmed that to reunite them was in each child's best interest.

SYSTEMS, OUTREACH & PREVENTION

Many prospective parents struggle with the paperwork and processes with adoption. While we support the process with Home Study Reports (428) and **post-placement follow-ups** (357) we also offer counselling for waiting parents (261 this year).

PREVENTION & OUTREACH

We organised a district-wide **adoption rally** with the DCPU to raise awareness about adoption and sensitise the public on it. We also held a half-day training for ASHA workers who are the frontline health workers under the National Rural Health Mission.

A steady bed, a steady timetable, a steady adult, routines that let children learn, heal and grow.

Shishu Home provides a safe place of residence for girl children from our school, whose home situations are either unsafe or unsupportive, where they are at risk of being removed from school. Our Mangala Home offers a safe, empowering space for adolescent girls and young women for temporary shelter or long stay, whether to have a place to study for exams, or attend a course or focus on their future.

Here, they have the space, care and opportunity to study, grow, discover their talents, and build a strong and supportive network. They experience stability and a stronger foundation from which to plan their future.

- At Mangala Home our senior girls balanced board-exam preparation with home responsibilities, mentoring younger children at the Home. Bhagyashree hopes to pursue engineering and wrote the Karnataka entrance exam.

STUDY SUPPORT & ROUTINES

We ensure there is time allocated for study and homework. Our Homes are equipped with a library and we make sure that children have the learning support they need.

HEALTH, NUTRITION AND FREE PLAY

All children receive regular health checks and monitored for developmental progress. Food cooked and served is balanced, nutritious, and uses local produce. Children are encouraged to use the after-school hours to play, learn and further their interests.



CHOOSING BETWEEN SSLC AND NIOS

While we offer the State School Leaving Exam board, not all our children are able to complete it. So, we reintroduced the National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS) as an alternative for students aged 14 and above to complete their education at their own pace. This academic year, we enrolled 15 students (5 girls and 10 boys) who were mentored by a team of 5 teachers



To complete the SSLC is a huge achievement, a first for many of our students' families.




STEM SPECIALS

State selections across three disciplines

Across the year, eight students earned state-level selection across table-tennis, athletics and basketball. **Thilothama** and **Sindhu** stood out for their performance; Sindhu won the state level table tennis tournament while Thilothama had the extraordinary achievement of representing the state in athletics, table tennis and basketball. Priyadarshini represented our school at the state level chess tournament.

Representing India at Unicon 21

In a proud moment for Shishu Mandir and India, 10 students, led by long-time mentor, David Foy, represented the country at Unicon 21, the global unicycling championship in Minnesota, USA.

Athletes from 28 countries participated. Punith, Kokila, and Balaji cleared IUF Level 5, placing among the top 10 unicyclists worldwide.

The students had the opportunity to visit Aurora Flight Sciences, Boeing HQ, and Washington, DC, including the White House and Lincoln Memorial.



Infrastructure

In August, we inaugurated our Multipurpose Hall, a significant addition to the school's infrastructure. It serves as a space for breakfast and lunch everyday, for afternoon rest for our youngest children, as a venue for celebrations, parent-teacher meetings, activities, games and even competitions.

We also refurbished our kitchen, which now supports more efficient and hygienic food preparation.

Two new classrooms were inaugurated on the first and second floors.

An Aeromodelling lab was also inaugurated and equipped to help students design and build model airplanes using balsa wood and other lightweight materials.

In support of the girl child

The Aspire Programme by KPMG continues into its 11th batch, empowering academically strong girls from Class 9 onwards with a holistic 9-year support structure. Batch 11 started with 13 new students, with an orientation session attended by students and parents with KPMG representatives. Aspire students are divided into mentorship groups, each led by KPMG Associate Directors. Mentors guided the girls on academic planning, personal growth, and goal-setting through regular check-ins.

In January, a global team from Boeing visited Shishu Mandir to inaugurate the Sukanya programme, first announced by the Prime Minister of India last year. Under this initiative, any girl from a financially disadvantaged background who completes her 12th grade in the science stream with at least 60% marks will be eligible for a scholarship of up to Rs 8 lakhs to become a pilot. This amount will fully cover her training until she becomes a certified pilot.

WHY THIS PROGRAMME IS NEEDED

By a mix of both financial support and mentoring, we are helping our students stay in college. Soft-skills training and exposure to workplaces build confidence so they can translate degrees into jobs.

Our courses are designed to equip youth with employable skills. We offer finance & accounting, graphic design, two-wheeler, electrical, beautician and tailoring courses. Our trainers train and simulate real-world experiences. At the end of the course, our placement team arrange for interviews to place our graduates in employment as quickly as possible.



ALUMNI OUTCOMES

Average salary on first placement is Rs 14,576 and at the end of two years, Rs 23,700. Each alumni donates Rs 500 from their first salary which is used for community welfare such as blanket distribution and government school support.





TRADES & LEARNING MODEL

Training includes life skills, spoken English, music, theatre, basic computer skills, sex education and awareness sessions. We emphasise attendance, punctuality, teamwork and communication - habits employers look for.







EMPLOYERS & INTERVIEW PIPELINE

We actively engage with prospective employers and now welcome several of them for campus interviews. Employment pipeline is 50% through repeat companies, 20% with new companies, 5% campus interview, 5% secure jobs independently and a further 10% choose alternative paths or drop out.



In a short span of 3-6 months, these youth rediscover hope and optimism for their future

We follow up with employers and alumni for a 2-year period to address issues and concerns both may have, and to ensure that our students find a stable and steady workplace.

CHALLENGES

Training alone does not equip a youth to take up employment and remain at work. Approx. 10% quit in the first year.

OUR RESPONSE

While we do stress on the expectations of a workplace and employers, it's when students join the workforce do they truly understand it. Our support at this time is critical to keep them employed and help them navigate the workplace.

EARNINGS MILESTONE

What began as a small step to empowering women has become a movement in the city, changing lives significantly. Mothers who couldn't afford rent now run stable households, young women are planning college studies, and communities are definitely inspired.

KEY INSIGHTS

- 50% of the e-auto drivers have changed houses, from tiny one room sheet houses to more stable buildings, affording the higher rent.
- 15% leased a house (min. Rs 3 lakh) with own savings.
- Nearly all are prioritising children's education and quality of life.
- · Nearly all of them are free of debt.

WHEN WOMEN DRIVE

Our drivers are extremely happy as they are independent and can set their own work hours. It means that they can now spend time with their children, even dropping off and picking them from school. They enjoy having a weekly day off, which they could not have, while working as domestic help. All of them expressed a newfound respect as auto drivers, which has boosted their confidence.

CURRICULUM & SAFETY

All our trainees get as many hours of practical training as they need and some of our senior auto drivers mentor the new trainees and share their experiences. Technical training is offered by the Mahindra team. Additionally, we also offer life skills, basic English and self defence sessions.

THE NOVELTY OF WOMEN DRIVERS

Women auto drivers are still not very common in the city. But our drivers are changing that. Not only are more women coming forward to participate in this programme, but they are working together. One of the challenges has been of harassment from male auto drivers. The group reported instances of verbal abuse, physical intimidation, and being denied the right to stop their vehicles, with many of the male drivers doing so under the influence of alcohol. A formal complaint was handed to the local political leaders.

On the positive side, Atos organises a biannual dedicated event for our e-auto women where they listen to their experiences, to see how they can address some challenges or upgrade their experience. This year, every driver was given a phone stand to enhance their comfort and efficiency while driving. The sessions end with an extravagant meal for all the women.

The highlight this year was when Ms. Allison Kirkby, CEO, British Telecom, along with her board of directors visited Bangalore and requested an auto ride with one of our drivers! It will be remembered by all of us for a long time.

When women are empowered to become independent and selfemployed, the whole family benefits.

1000th TRAINEE

We reached a milestone, when we admitted our 1000th trainee in our driving school. Rajeswari Vijaykumar was raised by a single mother and managed to study till the 7th. Her mother, a vegetable vendor, got her married very young to a chronic alcoholic. She endured years of emotional neglect, financial instability, and domestic hardship and raised her two young sons by working as a domestic help, earning ₹6,000 a month. Her children are 5 and 2 and her husband is mostly absent. Rajeswari's aspirations are clear: to provide her children with the education and opportunities she never had. Enrolling in Shishu Mandir Driving School is a step towards financial independence and self-respect.

AUTO ANGELS

Gitanjali, an e-auto driver, encountered an elderly lady who appeared to be disoriented and alone. She brought her to the police station, where it was discovered that she was reported missing. Gitanjali traced the woman's address and successfully reconnected her with her family.

Tamilselvi, an e-auto driver, was approached by a neighbour at 1 am as he needed to admit a pregnant woman to the hospital. She immediately obliged and in appreciation of her timely assistance, the family offered Tamilselvi the honor of naming the newborn.



SOCIAL CHANGE

While we are aware that the pressing need of the villages around us is for better education, better healthcare and stable employment, we are also keen to address social concerns such as high alcoholism, unstable family dynamics, treating the girl child as inferior to sons, chronic debt, and sanitation and hygiene.

For us to see generational change, education must be supported with empowering families and communities.

TRAINING TEACHERS

We have formalised our Teacher Development Programme led by Mr Pradeep Kumar and offered to schools. Four batches totalling 135 teachers from Bangalore, Tumkur and Kollegal went through the training.

EDUCATION OUTREACH

We have several interventions towards supporting children in schools in our communities:

- Educational Sponsorship Project for 200 students (91 boys, 109 girls) enrolled across 26 Englishmedium schools, with one third having lost one or both parents.
- 478 students benefitted from Education on Wheels, where a fully-equipped bus with a teacher visits 4 schools weekly for computer education.
- 5 evening study centres running with 200 students supported through it.
- Evening study classes, track suits and uniforms for children, laptops for schools also set up in nearby government schools.



ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS

110 (approx. 37%) of our students have an alcoholic parent. To support them and other neighbouring families affected by alcohol addiction, we host the AA meetings on campus, four times a week (7–8 PM). Average attendance is about 20, but those who are regular are showing progress.



CLEAN WATER

With the support of Herbalife, we were able to equip 20 government schools across Bangalore with water purification units. This ensured purified drinking water for approximately 9,500 children. Each unit had a capacity of 250 litres/hour and came with stainless steel storage tanks and an adequate number of water taps to ensure easy access for all students.

BLANKETS FOR URBAN HOMELESS

With the support of Sri Sai Garments Company, we distributed warm blankets to 650 people in 10 underserved areas, K. Narayanapura, Pai Layout, H Cross, Kithaganur, Bhattarahalli, Anandapura, Akshaya Nagar, Marathahalli, Kundalahalli, and Dodda Kuntanahalli. The Rotaract Club of Shishu Mandir took charge of field surveys, to identify beneficiaries, and distribute the blankets.

SHISHU MANDIR SOCIETIES

The Shishu Mandir society in India is the primary fundraising body with sister societies in Germany and Switzerland, along with the Friends of Shishu Mandir supporting where needed.

Donors fund the month; funders build the year; visitors keep us honest.

Shishu Mandir - Zukunft für Kinder e.V. Germany: The Shishu Mandir German Society continues to raise funds for us, a significant portion through the sponsorship programme. Special funds were raised for adoption services through **Baby Nest**. The **Hübner** and **Kennedy Foundation** also extended their support this year, contributing towards the driving school initiative. The Rahim Foundation continued its valuable support this year as well, funding the education of 200 students across 26 schools.

Shishu Mandir – Schweiz: The Swiss society continued to support us in identifying new sponsors and raising funds for our adoption programmes.

Our adoption programme received valuable support from **Ms. Cindy Barker** from the USA and the **Government of India**.

Our school continued to receive financial support from several corporate partners, including **Boeing**, **KPMG**, **Blue Yonder (JDA)**, **Northern Operating Solutions Pvt. Ltd.**, **Informatica Business Solutions Pvt. Ltd.**, **Equal Sky**, **Ion Exchange**, **Target**, **Accel India Management Company Pvt. Ltd.**, **Daiwa Corporate Advisory India Pvt. Our school also received generous contributions from over 2,500 individual donors.

For the first time, we received funding from **FANUC India Pvt. Ltd.**, which supported the reconstruction of the basketball court, improvements to the children's home, and various school sports activities.

We also received matching grants from **Boeing** through the YourCause platform. Under this programme, Shishu Mandir receives a contribution of USD 10 per hour for every hour an employee volunteers at our organisation. These funds are utilised to support the development of our children, covering infrastructure needs, staff salaries, nutritious meals, and a wide range of extracurricular activities such as dance, music, theatre, sports, yoga, chess, and more.

Target Corporation India Pvt. Ltd. remains our biggest supporter for the community college, supporting staff salaries, student meals, and the purchase of machinery and equipment essential for skill training.

Tech Mahindra extended its support towards the operational expenses of selected vocational courses, particularly those under the SMART Programme.

The **Schneider Electric Foundation India** continued to support our Electrical Training programmes by funding both operational costs and infrastructure needs.

For our e-auto project, our biggest supporter is Herbalife International India Pvt. Ltd., who provided 115 e-autos last year. In addition to supporting the training of women drivers, they also contributed to the installation of pure drinking water systems and rainwater harvesting structures in 20 government schools this year. For the first time, Concern India Foundation joined hands with us by supporting the distribution of 30 e-autos and funding the training of 55 women in driving.

We also received generous contributions from several organisations, including NASSCOM Foundation, YourCause, Online Giving Foundation India, CAF America, Myriad USA, CAF India, UK Online Giving Foundation, Give Foundation, and the Guardians of Dreams Foundation.

We hosted **six volunteers from Germany** who supported us in the homes and schools and **30 interns from professional colleges**, mentored and placed across departments. Visits from **KPMG**, **Daimler**, and **Atos** brought encouragement and learning opportunities for our children.

We remain deeply committed to nurturing every child and family who walks through our doors.
